Don't Sweat the Small Stuff

It is sort of a classic roadmap to managing your high-tension job. It helps you to stop worrying about the aspects of your work that are beyond your control and transform your outlook. For example, there are good tips about how to maximize your time and ease stress during corporate travel, or any type of travel, including the stress of traffic if you commute to and from work. With the tips shared, traffic will no longer be seen as the enemy. Listening to a podcast, an audiobook or perhaps calling a friend or relative to catch up and pass the time during traffic can actually save you time later.

# 114 Greenwich Hospital-affiliated physicians named 'Top Docs'

A total of 870 Yale New Haven Health (YNHHS)-affiliated physicians earned a spot on *Connecticut Magazine's* 2025 Top Doctors list – 114 of whom are affiliated with Greenwich Hospital. The list includes physicians from across the health system, as well as Northeast Medical Group and Yale Medicine and surpasses the more than 700 providers who achieved "Top Doc" status last year. The list appears in the May issue of *Connecticut Magazine*.

To compile the list, *Connecticut Magazine* partnered with Castle Connolly, a national healthcare research company. Castle Connolly's research team thoroughly vets each physician's professional qualifications, education, hospital and faculty appointments, research leadership, professional reputation, disciplinary history and if available, outcomes data.

Additionally, a physician's interpersonal skills such as listening and communicating effectively, demonstrating empathy, and instilling trust and confidence, are also considered in the review process.

The online nominations process is open to all licensed physicians in America who are invited to nominate physicians in any medical specialty and in any part of the country, as well as indicate whether the nominated physicians is, in their opinion, among the best in their region in their medical specialty or among the best in the nation in their medical specialty. Once nominated, Castle Connolly's physician-led team of researchers follow a rigorous screening process to select top doctors on both the national and regional levels.

Careful screening of doctors' educational and professional experience is essential before final selection is made among those physicians most highly regarded by their peers. Doctors do not and cannot pay to be selected as Castle Connolly Top Doctors.

# GH earns an 'A' Hospital Safety Grade from The Leapfrog Group



Greenwich Hospital has earned an "A" Hospital Safety Grade from The Leapfrog Group, an independent national nonprofit watchdog focused on patient safety, achieving a top score for the Spring 2025 report. This new grade for Spring 2025 is a national recognition for GH's commitment to patient safety.

Leapfrog assigns an "A," "B," "C," "D" or "F" grade to general hospitals across the country based on over 30 performance measures reflecting errors, accidents, injuries and infections, as well as the systems hospitals have in place to prevent them.

"This is an outstanding achievement for Greenwich Hospital," said Karen Santucci, MD, chief medical officer. "As a high reliability organization, we strive to consistently perform safely, efficiently and with high quality."

Greenwich Hospital earned "A" grades in the Spring and Fall of 2023, as well as Fall 2022.

The Leapfrog Hospital Safety Grade rates the safety of general hospitals in the United States. The grade is based on over 30 measures, including the number of errors, accidents, injuries and infections, as well as the hospital's systems to prevent them. The program is peer-reviewed, fully transparent and free to the public. Grades are updated twice annually, in the fall and spring.

# Inpatient Diabetes Care Joint Commission Advanced Disease-Specific Certification

This is the ten-year anniversary of Greenwich Hospital receiving the Joint Commission Advanced Certification for Inpatient Diabetes Management. In June 2015, Greenwich Hospital was the first hospital in Connecticut to achieve this certification. There are only about 40 institutions nationally with this advanced certification

The American Diabetes Association Standards of Practice for hospitalized patients continue to be the clinical practice guidelines used to direct the program activities and performance improvement activities. These standards support patient safety and include ensuring that a HbA1c is obtained and documented within 90 days prior to admission to support management during admission and facilitate better informed discharge planning; monitoring and treating hypoglycemia and hyperglycemia; providing diabetes self-management education to patients based on assessed needs; and providing diabetes education to all staff based on their role in patient care.

Most often, diabetes is not the primary reason for admission. As such, these patients may be located on any patient care unit. Regardless of location or reason for admission, their diabetes management and educational needs must be assessed and addressed.

In addition to YNHHS policies and guidelines for inpatient diabetes management, the Clinical Pathway, "Diabetes and Hyperglycemia" was launched in 2022 as an additional tool for providers and provides recommendations for medication regimens during admission and at discharge, insulin ordering and titration to achieve glycemic targets, patient-owned insulin pump and continuous glucose monitor use during admission, as well as additional support and guidance. The pathway provides links to order sets to support clinical care.

# The 2023-2025 Diabetes Metrics Greenwich Hospital reports to The Joint Commission:

- Basal-bolus insulin ordered: Patients with diet order for three meals per day have insulin order for basal-bolus (prandial) insulin.
- Follow up appointment: Patients with HbA1c
   ≥ 9% have follow up appointment with PCP,
   endocrinologist or diabetes educator; documented on AVS.
- Hypoglycemia Treatment Provided: Hypoglycemia treatment provided is documented.
- Diabetes Nursing Plan of Care (POC) added to patient chart: Diabetes nursing POC added to chart based on admitting diagnosis and/or glycemic management during admission.
- Performance Improvement Project: Coordination of pre-meal insulin with meal tray delivery.
