Greenwich Hospital launches revolutionary treatment for enlarged prostate

HoLEP is here! Greenwich Hospital has successfully performed its first Holmium Laser Enucleation of the Prostate (HoLEP) procedure, marking a major milestone in advanced urologic care for Fairfield and Westchester Counties.

HoLEP is a state-of-the-art, minimally invasive procedure that treats benign prostatic hyperplasia (BPH), or enlarged prostate—a condition that affects nearly 50 percent of men over age 60 and up to 90 percent over age 80. Using a highpowered holmium laser, the HoLEP technique removes excess prostate tissue causing urinary obstruction, offering a long-lasting solution with fewer complications and shorter recovery times compared to traditional surgical options.

The expansion to Greenwich was spearheaded by the Yale Medicine Urology team and its director Dan Kellner, MD, associate professor, YSM. Collectively, Dr. Kellner and his team have performed over 1,800 HoLEP procedures, making Yale Urology one of the busiest HoLEP teams in the US.

Isaac Y. Kim, MD, chief, urology, YNHHS; chair, Department of Urology, YSM, noted: "Introducing HoLEP in Greenwich is a testament to the strength of our integrated urology program. We're proud to see this level of innovation expanding across our health system."

With this inaugural procedure at Greenwich Hospital, the hospital becomes a go-to provider for HoLEP in Fairfield County and Westchester Counties, bringing Yale New Haven Health's academic-level expertise closer to home.

Health AI Championship winners announced

Last month, Yale New Haven Health's Center for Health Care Innovation hosted the first Health AI Championship, a competition designed to showcase groundbreaking applications of artificial intelligence (AI) in health care.

Innovators from health systems and hospitals across Connecticut were invited to develop AI-driven solutions that address critical challenges in patient care and healthcare operations.

The event fostered collaboration and paved the way for real-world applications that can significantly improve patient outcomes and streamline healthcare operations. The championship was guided by an advisory group of clinical and operational leaders from YNHHS, Hartford HealthCare, Connecticut Children's Medical Center, Nuvance Health, UConn Health and Gaylord Specialty Healthcare.

Know Your Numbers Plus 2025 underway

The annual Know Your Numbers Plus wellness rewards program is currently underway. The program gives YNHHS employees, including employed physicians, the opportunity to earn up to \$500 credit toward the cost of their 2026 YNHHS medical premium – and be healthier at the same time.

Completion of a basic health screening, the core of the program, earns \$300 in credit. These biometric screenings may be scheduled at onsite locations, including at Greenwich Hospital, and provide the following data:

- Total cholesterol, HDL (good cholesterol),
- LDL (bad cholesterol), triglycerides and blood glucose
- Blood pressure
- Height, weight and body mass index (BMI)
- Waist and hip measurements

Employees can earn up to \$200 in additional credit (towards the maximum \$500 credit) by completing other Personal Choice Activities. All program details are outlined on the THRIVE intranet site or through HRConnect, under Health and Wellness, Quick links. All Know Your Numbers Plus elements must be completed by Aug. 22, 2025.
