Y-Access Youth Access Program Update: We Did It!

Dear Mighty Team,

I would like to provide an update on the Y-ACCESS Youth Access program held June 26-30, 2023: WE DID IT – and that is a collective WE!! We could not have done it without all of you!

Stacey Green, Ellika Mardh and I would like to extend our most sincere gratitude to Greenwich Hospital and its medical staff. Because of you, we had a really successful pilot Y-ACCESS Careers in Healthcare Explorers Program for high school seniors and college students interested in careers in healthcare.

Fifteen students (all relatives of folks who work here at Greenwich Hospital) participated in the program. By the time it was all said and done, the students had been exposed to:

- A. Hands Only CPR
- B. Heimlich: adult, child, infant
- C. Recognition of stroke
- D. Recognition of myocardial infarction
- E. Two medical simulation sessions: Cardiac Arrest/V Fib/Defibrillation and Anaphylaxis and four trips to the Simulation Lab.
- F. Seven tours: Laboratory, Emergency Department, Plant, Diagnostic Imaging, Pharmacy, Pediatric Ambulatory Surgery Center and Hyperbaric Oxygen/Wound Center.
- G. More than 50 guest speakers, introductions to HIPAA Training, Infection Prevention and professionalism
- H. Two EMT-Cs who assisted as facilitators, simulated patients and models for ultrasound
- I. Hands-On practice of procedures/techniques: Care of Sprains/RICE/Administering EpiPen, CPR, Heimlich, SBAR.
- J. Panel discussions x 3 (RN, APRN, PA, RT and F&N, EVS, Transport, SPD and Registered Dieticians)

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- K. Round Robins (was a bit scary planning but was a FAVORITE for the students): Anesthesia, Cardiology, Critical Care, Infection Prevention, Hospitalist Medicine, Internal Medicine, Maternal Fetal Medicine, Medical Education, Outpatient Center, Pediatrics, Pulmonary, Psychiatry, Quality, Radiation Oncology, Residency, and Surgery, Trauma)
- L. Hands on ultrasound
- M. Daily worksheets, word scrambles, medical rhymes, quizzes and prizes after each exercise
- N. Special surprise 'Patient Visits': Ana and Aine Phylaxis who presented in extremis and received lifesaving therapy by the students
- O. Lunch sessions: DEI, Safety Science, HRO Principles and stories from the ED
- P. A bonus session thanks to Kisha Mitchell Richards and the pathologists: the students (and Stacey Green) got to see cancer cells under the microscope with our pathologists and went crazy!
- Q. Graduation: each student received an awesome Greenwich Hospital canvas bag, water bottles and a great First Aid Kit
- R. Evaluations: The majority of the feedback we received was that they wanted the program to be longer. They said they didn't want it to end! Several parents reached out saying that their kids were actually sad the following Monday when they didn't have the classes to go to. All participants wished the program could have been two weeks instead of one, except for maybe Stacey, Ellika and me who were kind of pooped afterward (granted we are 30-40 years older than the students)!

Thank you all so much again and hope you are enjoying a wonderful and safe summer!

Pride

In June, we saw the Tony Awards on TV, a show that celebrates Broadway theater, and as importantly, the lives of LGBTQ+ performers. It was a glorious night when

disenfranchised children across the country could watch "people like them" shine and be embraced by the world.

June was also Gay Pride Month. For me it was a month of reflection – reflecting on past struggles, joys and the continued prejudices facing us today. During Pride month in 2013, DOMA (the Defense of Marriage Act) fell, and I recall feeling a physical jolt. I always thought I didn't believe in marriage. It turns out it wasn't that I didn't believe in it, it was that I never had the expectation that I could have it; I was never allowed to dream of it.

I did marry soon after, in front of a community of family and chosen family. Thirty years prior to DOMA's fall, the LGBTQ+ community didn't gather to celebrate weddings – we gathered in Washington to march for basic rights. Our expectations were simple: not to be fired or threatened for we who were. In the '80s and '90s, we were brought together for memorials or to see quilts of so many brothers who had died of a disease the government would not name. And when we raised champagne glasses, it was waiting for the first girl-on-girl kiss on TV (FYI it was LA Law and not much of a kiss!).

Things have changed and today the Queer community is more visible and much more accepted. I came to Greenwich 35 years ago, closeted to most of the medical community. Fast forward three and a half decades and I have recently ended my leadership position at Greenwich Hospital, and I am openly gay, married, out and proud. But recently there has been a major shift backwards: the "Don't Say Gay" rule has expanded through 12th grade in Florida; Arkansas and Texas have restricted doctors from providing gender affirming care while Alabama has made it a felony; many Republicans, in the wake of the overturn of Roe v. Wade, are asking to roll back constitutional protections for gay rights; the rates of depression, anxiety and suicide rates among trans and non-binary youth is alarmingly high. And the list goes on.

June is a month of reflection for me. Despite the joys, celebrations and parades, I am brought back to the poem "First They Came." No one is protected from hate.

In addition to honoring Dr. Hollister, this year's Benefit will also mark the public launch of the Campaign for Greenwich Hospital. In 2020 Greenwich Hospital entered the silent phase of this historic multiyear fundraising Campaign to realize critical investments within Oncology, Heart and Vascular, Children's, Neurosciences and Behavioral Health. At the center, pediatric surgeons from YNHCH will treat a range of conditions in gastroenterology, general surgery, otolaryngology, urology, and pediatric and adolescent gynecology. Expansion of children's health services is an important area of growth for the hospital.
